# From the Desk of Mr. Coffelt

Lamoni Community,

At the close of the 2018 State Legislative Session, two bills were passed that have an impact on our local school district, including: Senate File 2364 - Emergency Operations Plan and Senate File 2113 - Suicide Prevention, ACES Identification and Toxic Stress Response Mitigation Training.

Lamoni Community School District has always believed students excel in a safe, nurturing and positive environment. These two new state laws codify the responsibility of all schools in Iowa to put specific plans, strategies and actions into place to better realize this goal.

Senate File 2364 requires all public schools in Iowa to develop a high quality emergency operations plan for the district and individual school buildings. The plan needs to be completed no later than June 30, 2019 and must be reviewed and updated annually by local school boards. The plan needs to include responses to active shooter scenarios and natural disasters, requiring schools to consider recommendations from the Iowa Department of Education and consult local law enforcement and emergency management coordinators as plans are developed and implemented.

We are ahead of the curve in this area, as the District has focused on revising and developing our District Emergency Operations plan for the past three years. During this time, we have been more intentional about working with local law enforcement and staff to better prepare for a variety of threats including intruder and active shooter scenarios, as well as threats that involve fire, severe weather, and transportation accidents. We will spend this year reviewing state guidance and protocols to ensure our local procedures align with best practice.

We will continue to work with staff and students to talk and walk through a variety of different drills in order to ensure we are better prepared when we do have to respond to an actual event. Just this past month, during our early release for staff professional development, staff spent time reflecting on procedures in four areas, including: district vehicle and bus evacuations, classroom materials and resources needed during a crisis, the impact of concussions on learning, and procedures during mass crowd events, such as concerts or athletic competitions.

The second law, **Senate File 2113**, directs the State Board of Education to adopt rules requiring school districts to adopt protocols for suicide prevention and postvention, the identification of adverse childhood experiences (ACEs), and strategies to mitigate toxic stress response based on nationally recognized best practices.

Lamoni continues to be a leader here as well. The District participated in a trauma-informed care conference for our staff and with educators from Mt. Ayr, Diagonal, Central Decatur and Mormon Trail School Districts in August. This event provided nearly 250 educators that serve 1,750 students in Decatur and Ringgold Counties the opportunity to interact directly with state and local agency personnel and better understand what adverse childhood experiences are, as well as how to more effectively respond to and support all students in the classroom.

Staff are deepening their understanding about adverse childhood experiences after this conference by participating in professional development with Community Health Centers of Southern Iowa this semester as well as going in greater depth with by reading the Deepest Well by Nadine Burke Harris. This book provides an excellent insight from a medical perspective about the socialemotional, physical and behavioral impacts of trauma on students, families and communities.

While we have work to do to realize the goals established by each of these laws, I am confident we will not only meet the mandate, but create a school community that is safe and supportive for each of our students and families.

Thank you for your continued support. In all we do, PRIDE!
